Evening Meeting Friday 22nd March Steve Hopper "The genus *Haemodorum*" Prof. Steve Hopper needs no introduction to members of the Wildflower Society, having been a leading botanical researcher for many years. As a post-graduate student, he worked on the family Haemodoraceae while studying Kangaroo Paws. (Have you read his super little book "Kangaroo Paws and Catspaws" that was published in 1993? If not, it's in the library!)

Recently he has been studying the type genus for the family, *Haemodorum*, the Bloodroots. They are those spindly things that produce black flowers in early summer. Distribution, pollination, aboriginal uses - be prepared to be amazed!

# PLANT OF THE MONTH

Viminaria juncea





Swishbush

This fast-growing shrub or small tree can get to 5m high. The branches are slender and hang down, giving a weeping effect. The leaves are mostly reduced to slender phyllodes, but on seedlings and juvenile leaves there may be one to three leaflets.

Yellow flowers are produced all along the slender branchlets, giving it another common name of Golden Spray. They create an attractive display between October and December. They sway easily in the wind.

This plant can be found across the South West from Kalbarri to Revensthorpe, in winter-wet locations, such as streambanks, around lakes and depressions and on the run-off side of granite outcrops. It is a disturbance opportunist, growing quickly after a fire or flood, but may be relatively short-lived.

Propagation is by seed.

# Flowering in Summer



This is one of my favouite Jarrah forest plants. It forms a low clump on lateritic soil, and is easily distinguished by its distinctive leaves. The flowers come out in early summer, and are small and often hidden under the leaves.
